Answer Key — Lesson 1: Love Initiates

Key Verse: 1 John 4:7 (NKJV)

"Beloved, let us love one another, for love is of God; and everyone who loves is born of God and knows God."

1. The Starting Point of Love

- John is often called the Apostle of Love, because he wrote more about love than any other apostle.
- In verse 7, "love" is a verb—an action word—something we do, not merely feel.
- Our love for others begins with God; we reflect what He first showed to us.
- Love is the fruit of salvation, not the root of it.

2. God Took the First Step

- God didn't wait for us to become lovable before He loved us.
- Romans 5:8 shows that God demonstrated His love while we were still sinners.
- True love initiates; it moves first and acts on behalf of others.
- The Greek word agapē means love that acts for another's good without expecting anything in return.

3. The Call to Active Love

- "Let us love one another" is not a suggestion but a command.
- Love is not reactive—it is proactive.
- When we love first, we **reveal** the very nature of God to our students and coworkers.

4. Theological Insight

Everyone who truly loves is born of God and knows God.

- "To know God" means more than head knowledge; it means personal fellowship with Him.
- When we know Him, His love flows through us naturally.

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6. Classroom Connection

- Love that initiates looks like:

7. Practical Takeaways for Teachers

- 4. Small acts—notes, smiles, prayers—are **seeds** that God grows into fruit.
- 5. Pray by **name** for students who need extra grace.
- 6. Extend love to **fellow** staff through encouragement and service.

8. Reflection

- Love that initiates is supernatural, not natural.
- Every time you choose grace over grumbling, you partner with God in His redemptive work.
- Ask daily: "Who can I initiate love to today?"

Remember: God **loved** first—now it's our turn to take the first step.
